ABOUT LOMA LINDA UNIVERSITY

Loma Linda University (LLU) is a Seventh-day Adventist educational health sciences institution with more than 4,000 students located in Southern California. The University Organization is comprised of eight schools, with more than 55 programs offered including Medicine, Pharmacy, Dentistry, Nursing, Public Health, and Religion.

The Pharmacy Residency programs at Loma Linda University are under a joint collaboration between Loma Linda University Medical Center and Loma Linda University School of Pharmacy.

The Mission of Loma Linda University Medical Center is to continue the healing ministry of Jesus Christ, "to make man whole," in a setting of advancing medical science and to provide a stimulating clinical and research environment for the education of physicians, pharmacists, nurses, and other health care professionals. The original Sanitarium building opened in 1905. The current University Medical Center opened in 1967, and after the Children's Hospital was built in 1993, the total capacity exceeds 900 beds. A new Medical Center tower will open in the Spring 2021, standing at 268 feet – making it the tallest hospital in California. In addition, Loma Linda University Medical Center has several affiliated institutions nearby including Loma Linda University Medical Center East Campus, Behavioral Medicine Center, and Heart and Surgical Center. The Medical Center operates some of the largest clinical programs in the United States in areas such as neonatal care and outpatient surgery. It is also recognized as the international leader in infant heart transplantation and proton treatment centers for cancer. Each year, the institution admits more than 33,000 inpatients and serves roughly half a million outpatients.

Loma Linda University School of Pharmacy admitted its first class in the Fall Quarter of 2002. The Mission of the School of Pharmacy is to continue the teaching and healing ministry of Jesus Christ by educating competent, caring pharmacists who will serve as integral members of the health team. Our student body, as well as faculty and staff, are diverse both in ethnicity and religious background.

PROGRAM FEATURES

- The Loma Linda University PGY1 Pharmacy Residency Program is fully accredited by the American Society of Health-System Pharmacists (ASHP).
- The residents will develop the knowledge, attitude, and skills necessary to become an advanced pharmaceutical care practitioner. The program is structured to suit the individual needs of each resident and to provide an environment of quality training and pharmaceutical care.
- The PGY1 program offers residents a wide selection for their five elective rotations. With rotations such as pediatrics, oncology, transplant, and emergency medicine, Loma Linda University is able to provide residents with an engaging and diverse year of clinical experiences.
- With a growing number of PGY2 programs, Loma Linda University is dedicated to the necessary training of competent, clinical pharmacists in specialized areas.

TEACHING CERTIFICATE PROGRAM

Residents enrolled in the PGY1 Program will participate in the Loma Linda University School of Pharmacy Teaching Certificate Program. The goal of the program is to provide participants the experience and guidance necessary to understand and apply current educational issues in pharmacy education. In order to earn the certificate, each participant must meet the following requirements:

1. Attend the teaching seminars
2. Give a minimum of one didactic lecture (1 hr minimum)
3. Engage in a longitudinal teaching experience in the PY3 curriculum which includes developing and leading case discussions
4. Give one hour of accredited continuing education to pharmacists
5. Give one in-service
6. Present one poster at a professional meeting
7. Develop a teaching dossier

APPLICATION INFORMATION

Application Deadline: January 4, 2021 via PhORCAS
Period of Appointment: June 24, 2021 through June 30, 2022

Applicants should submit the following via PhORCAS:

- Curriculum vitae
- Letter of intent
- Pharmacy school transcript
- 3 letters of recommendation

Requirements of the Candidate:

1. Must be a permanent resident or citizen of the United States.
2. Graduate of an ACPE-accredited school of pharmacy (or from one in pre-candidacy status).
3. Eligible to be licensed to practice pharmacy in the state of California.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Base Salary: \$47,000 as an hourly employee

Staffing Weekends and Holidays: The resident is expected to staff every third weekend and every third holiday. Holidays include New Year's Day, President's Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving, and Christmas.

Employee Accessories: The resident will be issued an official Loma Linda University ID badge, an embroidered long white laboratory coat, and a pager at the beginning of their residency. The resident will be provided office space in the School of Pharmacy equipped with a computer, printer, phone, and office supplies.

Licensure: The resident is expected to successfully complete the process for licensure as a pharmacist in the state of California as soon as possible upon entering the program. Some benefits are contingent upon licensure.

Health Insurance: Health insurance is provided for all employees at a nominal fee. Employees may add dependents for additional fees.

Vacation/Professional Leave: Ten working days and adequate professional leave to attend conferences: ASHP Midyear Meeting, California Society of Health-System Pharmacist (CSHP) Seminar, and Western States Conferences. Any additional conferences require pre-approval and will be evaluated on a case-by-case basis.

Evaluations: At the completion of each LE, the resident will be evaluated. Quarterly evaluations will be completed by the Director and Coordinator of the residency. In addition, each resident will complete initial and quarterly self-evaluations. The resident will also have an opportunity to evaluate the preceptor at the end of the learning experience, as well as the overall program at the end of the year.

Drayson Center: The resident and immediate family members will have free membership to the on-site health and fitness center.

Tuition and Fees: Free tuition for LLU courses is available for up to eight units per year. Tuition reimbursement is based on final grade.
