Provision of Care

- Pharmacy services provided 24 hours a day, seven days a week
- Decentralized unit-dose service with Barcode Medication Administration, IV Additive Service, Automated Dispensing Systems, Physician Order Entry and Automated Prescription Filling
- Our Ambulatory Care Clinical Pharmacists, Inpatient Clinical Pharmacists, and Clinical Specialists provide a wide range of pharmaceutical care services to veterans in the inpatient and outpatient settings.

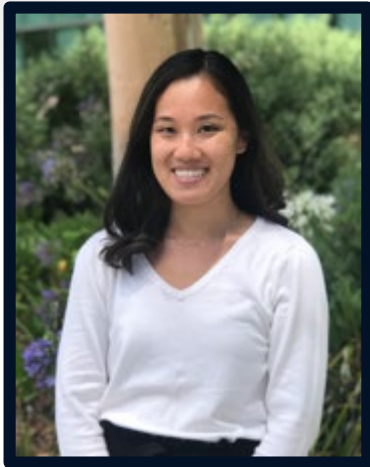

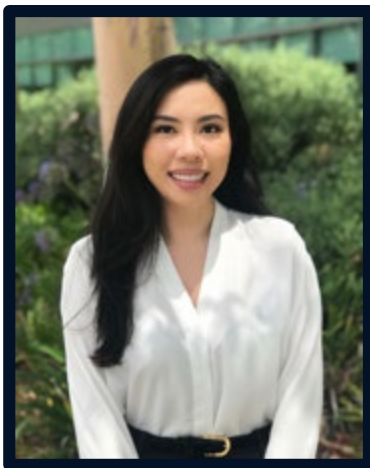

Ereca Nguyen

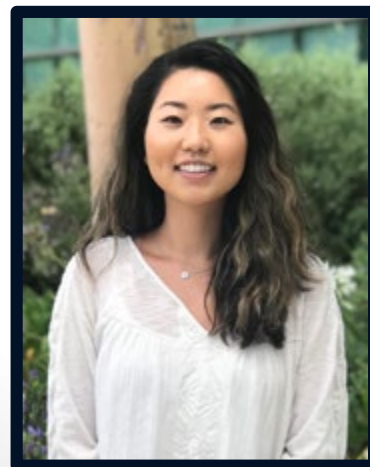

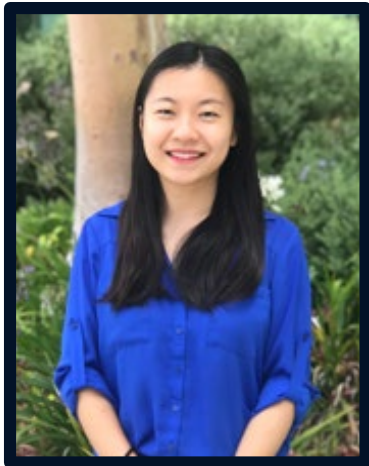

Pharmacist Licensure

Professional pharmacist licensure from any state must be obtained either prior to the beginning of the residency program or the resident must provide proof of sitting for the North American Pharmacist Licensure Examination (NAPLEX) and Multistate Pharmacist Jurisprudent Licensure Examination (MPJE) within 30 days from the first day of their residency training and must obtain professional pharmacist licensure within 90 days from the first day of their residency program.

Note: California licensure is highly encouraged for residents who wish to rotate through or conduct direct patient care activities in non-VA facilities.

PGY1

ASHP – PGY1 Program Purpose: PGY1 pharmacy residency programs build on Doctor of Pharmacy (Pharm.D.) education and outcomes to contribute to the development of clinical pharmacists responsible for medication-related care of patients with a wide range of conditions, eligible for board certification, and eligible for postgraduate year two (PGY2) pharmacy residency training.

VA San Diego – PGY1: Develop pharmacists who are:

- Prepared to provide cost-effective pharmacotherapy to adult and geriatric patients in acute and ambulatory care settings
- Proficient in communicating with and educating trainees, pharmacists, other health care providers and the community on drug related topics
- Competitive for additional post-graduate training, i.e., PGY2 or Fellowships

PGY1 Managed Care

ASHP/AMCP PGY1 Managed Care Program Purpose: PGY1 pharmacy residency programs build on Doctor of Pharmacy (Pharm.D.) education and outcomes to develop managed care pharmacist clinicians with diverse patient care, leadership and education skills who are eligible for board certification and postgraduate year two (PGY2) pharmacy residency training. A managed care residency will provide systematic training of pharmacists to achieve professional competence in the delivery of patient care and managed care pharmacy practice.

VA San Diego: Develop pharmacists who are:

- Eligible for a position in a managed care setting such as:
 - Formulary Management Pharmacist, Pharmacoeconomics Specialist, Data Analytics/Informatics Pharmacist, Prior Authorization Pharmacist, Drug Information Pharmacist etc.
- Skilled in formulary management and development processes:
 - Presenting at Pharmacy & Therapeutic Committee/Medication Safety Committee/Pharmacoeconomic Workgroup
 - Drafting guidance documents (conversions, protocols, criteria for use, monographs, etc.)
 - Managing clinical programs, drug utilization reviews, cost-saving initiatives, and quality improvement projects
 - Utilizing business informatics tools (i.e. SQL, Power BI, etc.) to drive formulary decisions
 - Reviewing non-formulary and prior authorization consults

Additional Training

Pharmacy Teaching Program

- Our pharmacy residents participate in the teaching of approximately 30 Doctor of Pharmacy students from the University of the Pacific and University of California, San Diego Schools of Pharmacy
- Pharmacy Residents serve as a preceptor to APPE students during rotations by providing formal and informal teaching and mentoring
- Residents facilitate weekly conferences consisting of topic discussions and clinical case presentations

Skill Development Series / Teaching Certificate Program

- All pharmacy residents participate in a Skill Development Series, which includes regularly scheduled discussion of research-related topics such as study methodology, biostatistics, literature evaluation, individual residency research projects and other contemporary topics relevant to health care professionals
- Participation in our Teaching Certificate Program is required and consists of didactic seminars and homework assignments, development of a personal teaching philosophy and providing formal teaching experiences in clinical rotational settings

Resident Service Commitment

Staffing will be scheduled once the resident has evidence of professional licensing and has demonstrated appropriate competencies. Training will be provided.

Staffing Requirements

PGY1 Pharmacy – General

- At least 20 inpatient days (includes 2 weekend days) during Medicine
- At least 6 days in the Ambulatory Care “Primary Care” Clinics and Outpatient Pharmacy
- Additional staffing days required during Critical Care, Psychiatry and selected elective rotations
- At least one additional weekend day scheduled for training

PGY1 Managed Care Pharmacy

- At least 15 inpatient days (includes 2 weekend days) during Medicine
- At least 4 days in the Ambulatory Care General Medicine (“Primary Care”) Clinics and Outpatient Pharmacy
- Additional staffing days may be required during selected elective rotations

Rotation Experiences

Required Rotations

INTERNAL MEDICINE

The resident will provide pharmaceutical care to medicine and surgery patients with a variety of medical diseases in a general medical teaching environment. The resident will work with multidisciplinary teams including physicians, nurses, dieticians, social workers and both inpatient/outpatient pharmacists/technicians to provide excellent patient care.

During the staffing component of the rotation, the resident will be trained for at least 3 weeks to demonstrate competency to independently staff the unit. The resident will become familiar to staff both inpatient and transitions of care when assigned.

During the rounding component of the rotation, the resident serves as the primary pharmacist on a medicine team and is responsible for order verification and other clinical duties including rounding with the medicine team.

CRITICAL CARE

The resident will develop and provide specialized pharmaceutical care to critically ill patients for the cardiology, cardiothoracic surgery and pulmonary/critical care teams in a teaching environment and provide direct patient care to these patients. The resident will become familiar with evidenced-based critical care therapeutic interventions, monitoring technologies and will participate in a comprehensive pharmaceutical care practice model. Daily responsibilities include attending interdisciplinary rounds, order verification and participating in codes when needed.

PSYCHIATRY

Residents have the opportunity to manage medications for patients during inpatient rounds and pharmacist-run mental health clinics. Under the guidance of 7 board-certified psychiatric pharmacists, residents will gain experience with facilitating patient interviews, designing treatment plans, and collaborating on a multidisciplinary team. Common conditions managed in this rotation include depression, anxiety, bipolar disorder, schizophrenia, post-traumatic stress disorder, and substance use disorders. The PGY2 Psychiatric Pharmacy Residency director facilitates weekly "Supervision" sessions, attended by PGY1 residents, PGY2 residents, and students on the psychiatry rotation. During these sessions, trainees can discuss patient cases, practice interviewing techniques, and present journal club articles.

INFECTIOUS DISEASES

PGY1 residents will gain experience on the infectious diseases inpatient service managing various types of infections. Responsibilities and opportunities include following any patients in the hospital that are consulted to the infectious diseases service, participating in daily interdisciplinary rounds, attending microbiology rounds, and attending teaching sessions organized by the UCSD ID department, topic discussions by PGY2 ID residents, and HIV case presentations by rotating pharmacy students.

ADMINISTRATION

Residents on the admin rotation will become familiar with the medication use system and gain exposure to pharmacy operations within different sections of the department.

Required Rotation

AMBULATORY CARE

When trainees rotate through the **PACT pharm clinics**, they will have many direct patient care opportunities and experiences with managing patients' chronic diseases including **but not limiting** to diabetes, hypertension, and dyslipidemia. **(See page 9 for list of ambulatory care electives)**

In **diabetes clinic**, we serve as clinician in managing patients with diabetes, hypertension, lipid care as well as related DM disease states. I precept trainees to be able to assess patient data and formulate a plan for managing, present to the team, and work on effective verbal and written communication skills

In **lipids clinic**, the resident will have the opportunity to work as an independent practitioner providing patient care and treatment interventions based on ACC/AHA, NLA and VA hyperlipidemia treatment guidelines.

The **Tobacco Cessation Program** has several modalities of care. In general, there are 1:1 on counseling and group format for the treatment groups. One-on-one counseling consists of Pharmacist Managed Telephone Tobacco Cessation Clinic (PMTTCC), VA Video Connect and Weekly co-facilitation chronic care groups like addiction treatment groups

Elective Rotations (See page 9 for list of elective rotations)

ONCOLOGY

During the oncology rotation the PGY1 resident will gain experience in managing cancer patients across various practice settings (outpatient, inpatient, and infusion center). They will provide supportive care to patients receiving anticancer treatment as well as have many opportunities to interact with patients who are on both IV and oral anticancer therapies. The PGY1 resident attends daily inpatient rounds and is the pharmacy liaison between the inpatient oncology team and oncology pharmacy.

EMERGENCY DEPARTMENT

This is an opportunity to learn in a fast-paced environment that provides both inpatient and outpatient experience. In addition, you can work closely with other healthcare providers as they are all here.

PAIN MANAGEMENT

The Pharmacy Pain Management Clinic is primarily a telephone clinic. As pain management pharmacists we implement, adjust, and monitor medications for pain under a scope of practice. By the end of the rotation, the resident will be able to implement pain medication management strategy and safe practices for patients with chronic pain.

Applicant Qualifications

- Register with the ASHP Resident Matching Program accessible at <http://www.natmatch.com/ashprmp/>
- Possess United States citizenship; Naturalized citizens must be able to provide proof of naturalization
- Possess a Doctor of Pharmacy degree from an accredited School or College of Pharmacy
- PGY1 applicants must be eligible for licensure to practice pharmacy from any state at the beginning of their residency program
- PGY2 applicants must be licensed to practice pharmacy from any state at the beginning of their residency program
- PGY2 applicants must complete or be in the process of completing an ASHP accredited PGY1 residency **OR** have equivalent experience

Application Process

- All application materials must be submitted through Pharmacy Online Residency Centralized Application (PhORCAS):

What teaching opportunities do residents participate in?

- Residents receive a teaching certificate through the San Diego Pharmacy Residency Leaders Program (SDPRL). They are expected to attend workshops with other residents in the San Diego region. Residents will facilitate Tuesday Conferences and will serve as a preceptor for 2 student presentations and develop 1 case discussions.
- Other teaching opportunities include mentoring pharmacy students on clinical rotations and providing in-service education.

Frequently Asked Questions

Does the pharmacy staff have a good relationship with the other health care professionals?

- Yes, this is a teaching hospital, so it is a very encouraging environment to foster clinical growth. The VA adopts progressive practices that allow pharmacists to provide direct patient care and the other members of the health care team see us as a valuable provider

What makes your program unique?

- We have dedicated and experienced preceptors who are passionate about teaching. Many of them also have a scope-of-practice that allows them to practice autonomously
- Large residency classes; 6-7 PGY-1s, 11-12 PGY-2s
- We have 10 onsite electives you get to choose from in addition to various off-site electives (subject to change)
- We offer 8 PGY-2 programs; many with early commit options
- Our staffing model is specific to the rotation you are in (see below)

What are the staffing requirements for pharmacy residents?

- There are dedicated blocks for staffing (ambulatory care, medicine) where residents will gain experience in order verification, outpatient pharmacy operations, IV preparations, and sterile technique
- No weekend staffing unless required by a specific rotation
- If available, we offer moonlighting/fee basis appointments where you can staff in the inpatient or outpatient pharmacy after rotation hours/weekends for additional pay

How are research project ideas determined?

- Residents are responsible for formulating their own research question and will gain skills in creating a study design and methodology, data collection and analysis, and presenting research findings.
